Observations principales / Key observations

- Volume: This period average: 77 posts/day; previous period average: 211 posts/day; last 30 days average: 130 posts/day
- Electoral reform is still being discussed on social media. This week included a TikTok video requesting vote by phone and a BitChute video suggesting SIN numbered ballots with public voting records.
- Foreign interference in Canadian elections continues to be an ongoing topic in the environment, though at low volumes. This week featured allegations of interference by Chinese entities, by Greta Thunberg, and some comments included allegations of interference operations being run by deepstate/CIA.
- Overall election-related volumes are down it appears that many social media users who normally
 engage with EC-related content have turned their focus towards vaccine mandates, provincial
 elections, and COP26.



Éléments sous observation / On the radar

Discussions of a coalition/agreement to delay a potential snap election

Starting around October 29, some news outlets reported that meetings were taking place between LPC and NDP officials about a potential agreement to avoid an election for 3 years. The news coverage generated relatively high levels of discussions, but mostly partisan. Some commenters called the process "undemocratic" as it might impede opposition parties' ability to do their job. The discourse also included a low number of comments speculating about an upcoming snap election; reactions to the prospect of a potential snap election were negative, showing little to no appetite for another election in the near future.

CCE responds to Spadina-Fort York issue of MP being dropped by party during writ period

On November 8, the controversy related to the Spadina-Fort York MP returned to the environment. News outlets reported on the OCCE statement that they would not act on complaints made against the MP. First reactions to that story demanded that EC or the OCCE to remove the MP and run a by-election. Users pointed out that the MP was still presented as an LPC candidate on the ballot even though he had been kicked out of the party days before election day, making it misleading and confusing for voters who might not have voted for him if they had known he was not a member of the LPC. News reports acknowledged the difficulty of EC's position re-issuing ballots that close to election day. New coverage produced little to no volumes, however the topic is persisting in news, including in Sinophone media.

Faits saillants sur les médias sociaux / Social media highlights

Concerns of foreign interference in the Canadian electoral process have persisted, particularly on niche platforms, albeit at a much lower level of engagement compared to months prior. The main areas of concern are state level foreign interference by China and individual level interference. Allegations of individual interference included political figures such as U.S. politicians and environmental activist Greta Thunberg – a throwback to a popular narrative from GE43. Finally, there are still many posts with ill-defined conspiracies by 'the deep state' and 'globalists' that many believe result in our elections being a sham. Overall there is a malaise that powerful forces beyond the control of ordinary citizens are eroding democracy.

This week. the social media monitoring team observed posts proposing electoral reform related to how electors vote. The first post, from TikTok, advocated for electors to be able to vote on their phone, a suggestion that received mixed responses. Positive reactions claimed such measures would help increase accessibility and voter turnout, while those against the idea alleged it would make it difficult to ensure those voting were not subjected to "voter intimidation." Another post, found on BitChute, suggested that ballots should have a unique code associated with the elector's social insurance number, in addition to a carbon copy that would go into the ballot box. The video also proposes that each code and recorded vote would be published following the election, which they claim would allow voters to check their vote was counted correctly.
