

Rapport de repérage des médias sociaux: du 23 décembre, 2021, 12h au 6 janvier, 2022, 12h Social Media Monitoring Report: December 23, 12pm – January 6, 2022, 12pm

Observations principales / Key observations

- Volume: This period average: 37 posts/day; Previous period average: 28 posts/day; Last 30 days average: 60 posts/day
- The anniversary of the protest that took place in Washington, DC, on January 6, 2021 generated severa discussions online. Some reactions in Canada included calls for electoral reform, and some present favourable comparisons highlighting Canada's electoral system and EC's independence.
- In the Canadian context, reflecting on GE44, discussions about electoral reform were popular and are
 not linked to media coverage; the discussion is mostly favourable and about voting age, redistribution,
 and the first-past-the-post system.
- Some social media users suggested that because EC was able to mail out voter information cards, government institutions should be able to mail rapid tests to Canadians to help address the most recent wave of COVID-19.



Éléments sous observation / On the radar

January 6 Capitol uprising anniversary raises concerns about democracy, comparisons to Canada's election system

This week, several media outlets (National Post, Globe and Mail, Global) published opinion pieces and articles discussing the events of January 6, 2021 in Washington, DC, and possible repercussions for Canada. Most of these pieces cited flaws in the American electoral system as one of the main causes for the uprising, and drew comparisons between that system and the Canadian system. Although EC was not cited directly, articles pointed to polls that show that Canadians have significantly higher levels of trust in their government and electoral institutions.

Discussions about reforms to the CEA have remained a popular topic over the past two weeks on social media, despite the lack of coverage from the traditional media. Since GE44, this topic has mostly been driven by comments and reactions to articles, but this reporting period saw several high engagement conversations emerge organically, suggesting the topic is of interest to users. When a mayoral candidate expressed his wish to see more people from diverse backgrounds get involved in politics, social media users were quick to propose electoral reform as the solution. One user commented "Looking at the evidence, it's pretty clear that



Proportional Representation is the way to accomplish this" and another claimed Australia's legislature has "a majority of women representatives" and credited it to ranked ballots.

In a TikTok video posted to her official page, Senator Kim Pate suggested lowering the voting age to 16, pointing to political involvement and activism done by teens. The comments were very positive, with users citing their own interest in elections at that age, and one user claiming "If we can trust 16 year-olds to drive, there is no reason why they can't vote."

Reflecting on 2021 and on GE44, an interesting interpretation of the success of GE44 despite the pandemic was the emergence of the narrative that if EC was able to mail out VICs in GE44, governments should be able to mail out rapid tests to Canadians to help address the current explosion of COVID-19 Omicron variant cases.

EC's mandate was also at the heart of discussions about the January 6 storming of the U.S. Capitol and GE44, social media users compared the electoral systems of Canada and the U.S. and overwhelmingly supported EC. Many news outlets and commentators also highlighted fears for the future of western democracy, though there was general agreement that the situation is better in Canada due to the presence and role of Elections Canada. Despite examples of imperfect adherence to the CEA in Canadian elections in the past, there was a general sense that Canadian democracy is in better shape.
